Abstract: Marriage and the acquisition of power. The depiction of weddings and marriages in Widukind of Corvey's "History of the Saxons" and what conclusions this allows us to draw about Henry I's succession arrangements

The Res gestae Saxonicae of Widukind of Corvey are an important testimony of Henry I's succession arrangements and are generally considered to provide evidence to be the basis for dating Otto I's designation as King in 936, as the chronicler reports how Henry on his deathbed declared his eldest son as his successor. However, since some sources suggest that Henry had already begun to plan for his succession around the time of the marriage of Otto and Edgith in 929/30, the discrepancy has led to several research controversies about the credibility of Widukind's report. This article aims to show a different interpretation of Widukind's text by demonstrating that the narrative contains a significant link between wedding motifs and the acquisition of power which has not yet been recognised. It will be shown that the chronicler specifically gave the three royal weddings of Edgith, Adelheid and Theophanu central importance in the rise and legitimation of the Ottonian dynasty. This enables a new perspective on Widukind's conception of kingship and the question of Henry I's succession. Here I argue that the chronicler described both the Anglo-Saxon wedding and the designation in the deathbed scene as constitutive acts of kingship and, further, that the source should thus no longer be viewed as testimony to a succession decision made in 936, but as a document of a complex and long-term process of the passing of kingship to Otto I.
