

Buchvorstellung: The Rise of an Academic Elite. Deans, Masters, and Scribes at the University of Vienna before 1400 Monica Brinzei (Paris)

Between Paris and Transylvania, between Bologna and Krakow, and an extension of the Oxford-Prague axis, the medieval University of Vienna played a crucial role in shaping the intellectual profile of Europe. Can we imagine a history of this university depicted via a scrutiny of the personal libraries of the first generations of professors at Vienna? In the 16th and 17th centuries publishers presented Henry of Langenstein (1332-1397), the father of the Faculty of Theology at Vienna, as the plantator of an academic paradise. The roots of this paradise are reflected in the harvest of books produced there. This talk will present how some autograph manuscripts from the collection of books that were produced or collected by the first generation of Viennese professors can shed new light on the production of academic knowledge in medieval Vienna.

Monica Brinzei is Deputy director of the IRHT; she conducted two ERC projects in Paris (ERC-THESIS and ERC-DEBATE) and co-piloted the project RISE, hosted by Babes-Bolyai University in Cluj-Napoca, which led to the discovery of new material concerning the beginning of the University of Vienna. Her research is focused on the history of medieval universities, especially on their development during the 14th and 15th centuries. In 2014, she launched the collection Studia Sententiarum at Brepols, for which she has supervised the publication of six titles dealing with the tradition of intellectual practices in the medieval faculties of theology all over Europe.
